Some SANE units are able to perform medical/forensic exams, free of charge for a victim of IPV, whether or not there was sexual assault at the time of the offense. These exams include screens for strangulation, Traumatic Brain Injury, and human trafficking. Excellent Photographs, risk assessments, and a listing of the other coercive controls are also included in this exam. The SANE is able to then testify for this exam, with expert knowledge of IPV dynamics.
